VPCC & Staff in Action...

Pastor Kisia Coleman, our Program Coordinator for our Violence Prevention Coordinating Council serves as the Co-Chair for the Park Forest Richton Park Neighborhood Network. On March 18th she met with Congresswoman Robin Kelly and her staff to address the food insecurity issue in our area. It is important that we maintain relationships with our elected officials to see how we can partner together and help our communities thrive. A subsequent meeting took place on April 8th with Representative Anthony DeLuca to address the same issue. Food insecurity is a social determinant of health and its prevalence in our communities is "both a cause and a consequence of violence, contributing to a vicious cycle" based on research conducted by Illinois State University. We will continue to work with our elected officials to improve our communities and help mitigate violence in any way possible. Congresswoman Kelly has been a strong advocate in the fight against gun violence. Her "2024 Kelly Report - Vision for a Safer America" is a tremendous eye-opener with a wealth of information that highlights the progress made against gun violence and the work yet to be done.

A VISION FOR A SAFER AMERICA

Any opportunity that we can share our story and increase our Council's visibility is taken seriously and is greatly appreciated. On March 20th the *League of Women Voters* for Park Forest, Illinois welcomed Pastor Kisia as their guest speaker at their monthly meeting to share the vision of our Chicago Heights Cluster VPCC. The meeting was informative and engaging. Ultimately, it garnered a lot of attention and interest and served us well with exposure and more community connections.

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
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
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GVPMH WORKSHOP HIGHLIGHTS

We conducted our first "Gun Violence Prevention & Mental Health (GVPMH) Workshop" on April 13, 2024, from 10 am - 2 pm at our Empowerment Center. Overall, we had a good crowd that stayed throughout the day, with a total of 72 people in attendance. Lunch was provided by Panera Bread ensuring there was something for everyone, whether you were vegan or had a sweet tooth. Most importantly, our expert speakers and their topics were on point and impactful:

- Sauk Village Police Chief Malcolm White started us off with his talk on "Our Safety & Security How Does Gun Safety Look?" He also led a brief training on using gun locks, their importance, and other safety information.
- Sherise Harris, a Sauk Village Resident and Department of Human Services Caseworker gave a heartfelt presentation on "Silence the Violence - How Domestic Violence and Gun Violence Affect Our Community."
- We found the best fit for our youth engagement was William Anderson of Aunt Martha's Health Care facility in Park Forest, IL. William has served our youth and families in our community extremely well for decades. His topic on "Youth & Us Youth & Justice How Comprehensive Community-Based Youth Services and a Juvenile Justice Reporting Center Can Have a Positive Impact on Gun Violence and the Mental Well-being of Our Community" was a source of enlightenment. His time included information regarding Aunt Martha's new Empowerment Program YOUTH4WARD.

- Dr. Mary Camper, Founder of Reestablishing Hope in Hazel Crest took time out of her busy schedule to spend the day with us and provided some much-needed therapy as an on-site counselor in our counseling room and during her segment on "Good Mental Health Is Your Wealth - How Certain Strategies and Skills Can Bring Stability to Your Soul."
- Our work in violence prevention has to be a team effort and LeShae Hudson, the Joliet Township VPCC was not without her team to help present her topic on "Help & Hope - How Should a Violence Prevention Organization and Community Respond When a Gun Violence-Related Incident Happens?" Joliet knows all too well the importance of responding efficiently and effectively to gun violencerelated incidents and LeShae's team has been at the forefront in responding.



We closed our workshop out with an impactful session presented by Shelley Williams, Exec. Director of *In Tandem, Inc.* in conjunction with Andre Thomas of *Integrity & Fidelity* (I & F) Inc. Along with members from the violence prevention outreach team, a presentation entitled, "Boots on the Ground Is How We Get Down - How Effective Community Outreach and Violence Prevention in the Streets Should Look." It was a remarkable look into the day-to-day activities of those in the violence prevention space who are closest to it, have lived experiences with it, and know how best to deal with it.

There is so much that needs to be done in the violence prevention space especially as it relates to gun violence. These efforts cannot be realized without adequate funding and support from the community. On May 4th, Kingdom Church International hosted its first "Pre-Mother's Day Jewelry & Accessories Pop-up Store Extravaganza." This fundraiser initiative was created to help further our programs and services. In total, we raised over \$1,200.

We have been diligently working with *Big Brothers Big Sisters* to bring their program to our Empowerment Center. Social determinants of health (SDOH) have a major impact on people's health, well-being, and quality of life. SDOH include examples safe housing, transportation, and neighborhoods. On May 14th, we hosted a special meeting and tour of our facility highlighting our VPCC and vision with Joliet Township's Supervisor, Angel Contreras, VPCC LeShae Hudson, and members of their REIAL-POV (Racial Equity Impact Assessment League - Peace Over Violence). Other guests included Cherise Williams (not pictured) representing Opportunity for Advancement, Inc. Workforce and PRNN's (Park Forest Richton Park Neighborhood Network) violence prevention's component.





On May 23rd, Pastor Kisia attended the *Mental Health Response to Mass Firearm Violence* (MHRMFV) Consortium hosted by the University of Illinois at Chicago's Institute for Healthcare Delivery Design and Population Health Sciences Program. It was a breath of fresh air for the VPCCs, Conveners, and 590s, to provide our thoughts, reactions, and ideas on our learnings around awareness, collaboration, and continuity as they relate to Providers, Communities, and Individuals. One of the most impacting parts of the day was the ideation activity where we compiled high-urgency and low-effort ideas as it relates to the topic.

On January 21, 2013, 15-year-old Hadiya Pendleton marched in President Obama's second inaugural parade. One week later, Hadiya was shot and killed on a playground in Chicago. Soon after this tragedy, Hadiya's friends commemorated her life by wearing orange, the color hunters wear in the woods to protect themselves and others. Wear Orange is now observed every June during National Gun Violence Awareness Month.

Thousands of people wear the color orange to honor Hadiya and the more than 43,000 Americans who are killed with guns and approximately 76,000 more shot and wounded every year. This year, National Gun Violence Awareness Day fell on June 7th.
